James 2:1-17

Pithy Comments

A few times recently a repeated post comes up on my Facebook feed: 'I need someone to explain to me why it's always "if you can't pay rent, buy fewer lattes and avocado toasts" and not "if you can't pay your employees a living wage, buy fewer yachts, rockets and spacecraft".' It's a comment about inequality and the link between the choices that are possible for billionaire business owners and their employees. It goes back to 2017 when a wealthy Australian property developer, Tim Gurner, said "When I was trying to buy my first home, I wasn't buying smashed avocado for \$19 and four coffees at \$4 each." Seven years later the comment is still reverberating around the internet with added criticism of people like Bezos and Musk.

The book of James offers pithy comments with a longer pedigree, and we are still talking about them centuries later.

James reminds us of teaching that goes back to Jesus and beyond him to Leviticus: 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' But James adds that to show partiality to the wealthy undermines this: 'Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him?'

James reflects Jesus' teaching that the Pharisees burden others with their expectations (Matt 23:4) and their tithing of dill and cummin is not as important as showing justice and mercy (Matt 23:23). James sums it up by saying, 'mercy triumphs over judgement.'

James resonates with Jesus saying about helping others in practical ways, that 'just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' James says it's not enough to tell people to keep warm and well fed without meeting their needs, 'So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.'

As a church, we have Christ Well Community Project to show God's love to our neighbours, to show mercy and to put our faith into practice. Take a few moments to ask God to show you how you might add to that in your personal life.
