Weekly Letter – 12 October 2025

Luke 17:11-19

The story of the ten lepers is memorable. Ten people are healed by Jesus, and only one returns to say, 'Thank you.' On the surface, it is a story about the importance of saying, 'Thank you,' and a recognition that it is often forgotten.

They are all told to go and show themselves to the priests (in the Temple in Jerusalem) to prove they are well. It shows that as well as being cured, they had to be re-integrated into society which had shunned them, by being pronounced well by the priests. At other times, Jesus criticises the Temple authorities controlling people's access to God, but here he recognises that part of the healing is to be accepted.

The man who returns, praising God and thanking Jesus is a Samaritan. They worshipped in a different place. Perhaps the expectations were not the same, though they followed the first five books of the Bible as laws from Moses. Maybe Luke is giving us a real-life parable to build on the story of the Good Samaritan, to show that all sorts of people will be included in God's new world because of their faith and actions. Perhaps also a wake-up call for those who assume we are already included to remember to praise God and give thanks to Jesus.

Take a moment to say, 'Thank you,' to God for you have noticed and appreciated today, and then thank God for the saving love shown by Jesus.
