Weekly Letter – 5 October 205





Lamentations 3:17-24

This coming Sunday is our Harvest Thanksgiving, we remember our dependence on other people for our food, our care for creation, and our reliance on God. It completes our marking of the Season of Creation.

We began with a reflection on Isaiah 32 with a prophecy about the palace being overrun with animals (did you see the news item this week about polar bears taking over a Russian weather station?) which ended with the hope of God's Spirit being poured out to make fruitful fields and safe dwelling places.

We end with these verses from Lamentations, which is a book of five hymns written as if the poet was standing in the ruins of Jerusalem after it had been over-run by the Babylonians and the leaders exiled. There are vivid images of the reaction to the walls being breached and the Temple destroyed in 587 BCE. I can imagine similar despair about the current destruction in Gaza, or of Homs in Syria in 2014, or Coventry and Dresden in World War II. Human inability to resolve problems without violence leaves behind a trail of destruction.

Yet the poet finds hope: the Lord's unfailing love and mercy still continue, as fresh as the morning, as sure as sunrise. A source of resilience, a basis to rebuild lives laid waste and communities reduced to rubble.

The climate crisis is part of the reason for marking the Season of Creation. The increased risk of extreme weather with floods and droughts affects harvests but will also have an impact on where and how people can live. We may hope for a technological fix, or for creative ways of holding companies and nations to agreements to tackle climate change, but we also point to God who calls all humanity to account, and trust in God's continuing unfailing love and mercy.

CHRISTIAN AID 80th ANNIVERSARY SERVICE - 17th SEPTEMBER

On a very wet evening we attended the Anniversary Service in Tabernacle, Cardiff, with a very big thank you to Elaine for driving us in such rotten weather.

The great organ playing and full chapel made the hymns sound wonderful. The speakers included Patrick Watt, Chief Executive of Christian /Aid, and Dame Sarah Mulllally, Bishop of London and Chair of Trustees, who gave a short history of Christian Aid, its humanitarian work and campaigns through the decades. We also learned that the first Church in Wales to support Christian Aid was Mumbles Baptist.

There were short videos on work in India and Sierra Leone. Dr Rowan Williams read a poem he had written for the anniversary, and Jane Hutt MS spoke very thoughtfully about the need to continue working to ensure Wales remains a welcoming and inclusive country.

Representatives of the sponsoring Churches joined with the congregation in speaking words of re-commitment. The URC was represented in this by Rev David Salsbury. The bilingual Service ended with the Blessing and a rousing version of Gariad dwyfol uwch pob cariad/Love divine all loves excelling.
