Matthew 24.36-44

The God who removes our dark glasses, and for a brief moment opens our eyes

We move from Luke's gospel to Mathew's, and I'm sure over the coming four weeks you will see and feel Matthew's style and emphasis. We also move from 'ordinary time' to Advent, and this is quite a change, as the readings are to ensure we are better prepared to welcome the Christ Child – i.e. we are encouraged to open our hearts and have them renewed. Why? Well, we will soon be faced with the bewildering implications of the Incarnation. For we will all be asked this key question, 'What <u>could life</u> be like with 'Emmanuel' – 'God is with us'?

Perhaps it might be helpful for you to know that the writer has always struggled to understand how best to enter into the spirit of Advent, as at times it all seems somewhat overwhelming. That said, I love this season of Advent, and I hope you do.

To our gospel reading! This passage has a bit of pizzazz and a clear message, which is reinforced within the final verse v.44, "so too you must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come".

Contained in this verse, and the whole passage is an undeniable truth. 'Don't forget our lives are short'. Jesus Christ focuses on this because, as he so often does, he is calling you to expand the horizon of your heart, and therefore to pray for the strength to seek truth, love God's laws, and cherish the eternal prize offered to you. Or put it this way, look at your daily life and the certainties you hold, and ask is there room for improvement? And perhaps here's the key! God has so much to offer all of us.

It's never been Christ's style to cause you fear or anxiety, rather his incisive words are offered to stimulate you into action, to encourage you to love, and love truth.

To be able to give greater focus to this, the passage also expresses what we need to remove from our lives, for example, being controlled by too many material concerns, or not being aware of our neighbours needs, and equally important closing our hearts to Jesus' concern for our future lives. For Christ is saying, "Everyday matters, so yes, have one eye on the material world, but you need an eye on heaven".

Please help us to spread some Christmas cheer

Our seven foodbank centres across Swansea at Clydach, Gorseinon, Mayhill, Penlan, Port Tennant, Uplands and West Cross are expecting to supply emergency food to 4,000 people, including 2,000 children in the run-up to Christmas. We are very short of food since we lost over half our donations from the public donation point at Tesco Fforestfach to other organisations that have been allowed by the store to start collecting food there. Our Foodbank Centres in two of Wales's most deprived communities at Penlan and Mayhill relied on the donations from Fforestfach. Their ability to continue providing food parcels is seriously affected. We don't have enough food or money to meet demand, so we are hoping that the generosity of local communities across Swansea will enable us to carry on helping the less fortunate this Christmas.

We need to raise £12,000 in food or financial donations to be able to carry on. If you are able to, please help us by collecting food and donating it to one of our centres or drop it off at Christ Well. Ideally, we need Christmas food before **Friday 5 December**, to allow us time to sort it and distribute it in food parcels over the two weeks leading up to Christmas.
