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Weekly Letter – 4th January 2026

Matthew 2:1-12

A new year has begun, but we are still the same people with the same concerns, and we are still praying about many of the same problems in the world. We are also still living with the wonder of God come in Jesus at Christmas, and seeking God as we move into remembering the ways God is revealed through the season of Epiphany.

We are familiar with this week's passage because we hear it every year. One of the striking things about the way Matthew tells the good news is how many scripture quotes are included. There was the quote from Isaiah about Jesus being 'Immanuel' – God with us. Now, there is the quote saying that the shepherd ruler would be born in Bethlehem, from Micah. There will be a reference to the voice of lamentation in Ramah from Jeremiah after Herod massacres the baby boys, and from Hosea saying about God calling his son out of Egypt. Then there is a quote which no-one can pin down about Jesus being a Nazorean, which Matthew links to Jesus growing up in Nazareth.

People wonder whether the writer of Matthew was a scribe, perhaps drawing on Matthew the tax collector's memories, on Mark's gospel and on a common source which Luke also had but we can only guess at. Later in Matthew, there is a reference to a 'scribe trained for the kingdom' bringing old and new out of his store, which people point to supporting this theory (Matt 13:52).

For us a key point is the continuity of God's involvement with the people he calls to continue his work. As we wonder about what changes to make in our lives in the new year, and how to make a difference in our world, we can know that God is with us, guides us, and inspires us to be part of his unfolding purpose.

Pray that God will guide you in the way you need. Pray that God will guide us as a church to find the way to him and find our way round the vested interests that shape our world.
